Listening skills development should be helped with visual aids in the classroom. It motivates and stimulates students' prior learning, making students engage into understanding including all the active and inactive vocabulary involved so comprehension could be developed to the fullest.

The first chapter talks about the problem and the deficiencies found in students. The second chapter shows the theoretical aspect and how such deficiencies were addressed according to the methods and formulations involved to conceptualize the problem at hand. 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CHAPTER I

THE PROBLEM

Research Context

The target population for this investigation is focused on the students of 8th grade of General Basic Education (EGB, for its acronym in Spanish) of the Educational Unit "Kruger Carrión Loor" Number 442, a public high school founded in October 31st, 2001, located in Cooperativa de Vivienda Pancho Jácome, a low-income neighborhood in Guayaquil, Ecuador. Nowadays, the school counts with eight hundred and fifty students and offers two shifts: morning and afternoon, and it is operating in a 505 square meter estate.

The educational unit got its start in January of 1981, with its original name "María Barquet Isaias." Its initial facilities were constructed on illegal property lands, therefore they were forced to evict the area within their early beginning years. However, with the passage of time, the educational unit managed to survive and functioned with a total of four hundred students.

Finally, thanks to the help of the former Educational Supervisor and Professor Kruger Carrión Loor, the school was eventually legalized. For this reason the school name was changed into the one it displays in current times: "Unidad Educativa Kruger Carrión Loor".

Conflict situation

Several problems have been identified within the group of students of 8th grade of the educational unit "Kruger Carrión Loor". For instance, the teacher does not apply strategies to teach listening skills. On the one hand, this occurs due to the insufficient technological resources, in this case there

is no access to a CD player for students and teachers to perform listening practices during class time. Instead, the teacher focuses on drillings, a technique that focuses on repeating from a listening model provided either by the teacher's direct words or from a recording, and written repetition of words or sentences, in addition to the teaching of grammar rules. Besides to this, the teacher does not make correct use of didactic material or appropriate strategies to engage students in the learning experiences.

On the other hand, as a result of the latter facts, students are not able to understand what the teacher explains. In fact, students are unable to enter a conversation because they simply cannot interpret what the speaker says, or they are incapable of understanding the lyrics of a song in English, or listen to the dialogues in a film in this language. In like manner, students are not able to answer the questions the teacher asks in class.

Under the circumstances mentioned before and as a consequence of them, students show little interest during English lessons, likewise they do not perform listening activities meant to develop their auditory skills. The result is that the listening comprehension skills needed to achieve the level A1.1, aim of this course, are not being developed within the English class.

For this reason, it is crucial to develop pre-listening activities that include the pre-teaching of vocabulary in order for students to be able to understand and therefore respond to information presented in a listening text.

Scientific Fact

Christine Goh (1998) developed a study over a population of more that forty students of English as a foreign language (EFL). The results showed that the main cause of the problems in acquiring listening skills is the little knowledge of English vocabulary. This was shown when a lot of

students reported that the unacquainted words remained the major problem at the moment of understanding a listening text.

Causes

- Insufficient didactic resources for developing listening skills.
- Isolation of listening skills practice within the process of learning of the English language.
- Incorrect use of listening strategies by the teacher.
- Little knowledge of English vocabulary by students.

Formulation of the problem

How do Pre- listening strategies influence in the development of listening comprehension skills in students of 8th grade from the Educational Unit Kruger Carrión Loor, District 8, Zone 8, in Guayaquil city, through the school year 2016-2017?

Research objectives

General objective

To determine how the listening strategies influence in the listening skills development through a field, bibliographical and statistical research in order to design a manual guide for the teacher to improve the development of the listening skills.

Specific objectives

 Identify listening strategies through a field study, bibliographic and statistical analysis.

- Define the development of listening skills through a field study, bibliographic and statistical analysis.
- To design a manual guide with pre-listening activities from the data obtained.

Research questions

- What is the importance of listening strategies in the development of listening skills?
- Why do students not develop listening skills properly?
- What is a manual guide for the teacher? And how could it be created for assisting listening skills development in students?
- How do the pre-listening activities play an important role in the development of listening skills in students?

Justification

The teaching of Listening Skills has been through a long line of changes since the first time any kind of strategy was used for the development of this ability. Yet the Common of Reference for Languages (CEFR), a standard that is used internationally for describing the different skills in the proficiency of a language, especially English, emphasizes that students European Framework must reach an adequate development of listening skills as described in the level A1 of this standard. The latter coincides with the expectations of the Ecuadorian English that emphasizes that students of 8th grade must reach a preliminary A1 level in English, which they call A1.1, from subdividing the A1 level into two stages –A1.1 and A1.2. Consequently, students within the Ecuadorian educational system must obtain a better performance of their listening abilities in their process of learning the English language.

Besides, the National well living national Plan states that the Ecuadorian system of education, including basic, and high school education, (art 343); in addition the higher education system (art 350), are the institutions called to strengthen the capacities and opportunities of the population and to train people academically and professionally under a scientific, humanistic vision including the knowledge and cultures of our people. This way, Ecuadorian people will be able to outperform academically and therefore have more opportunities in the labor field.

As a matter of fact, the Organic Law of Intercultural Education (LOEI) in its third chapter, article 7 states that all students have the right to: (f) receive educational support and academic tutoring according to their needs. Consequently, it is of great importance to offer learning strategies with the purpose of improving the listening skills of students.

Furthermore, according to Gillian (2011), Listening Comprehension is very important because it helps us recognize the relevance of global knowledge in students dealing with Listening Skills to help them improve in their language proficiency to the fullest. Thus, the Listening Comprehension skill is of great importance at the moment of improving the proficiency of a student who is going through the process of learning a foreign language, in this case, English.

Given these points, the main beneficiaries of this project are students from the 8th grade of the Educational Unit "Kruger Carrión Loor", because this proposal pursues as its main objective the improvement of listening comprehension skills through Pre-listening activities for the group of students mentioned. Therefore, in the long run, as more students might benefit from the strategies proposed in this project, it will give rise to better employment opportunities and social evolution for the citizenship in general in the country improving their quality of life in every aspect.

CHAPTER II

THEORETICAL FRAMEWORK

Background of the Investigation

The authors of this present, current, research project have focused the attention in searching the use of listening strategies to improve listening comprehension in English language learners (ELL). Considering that listening comprehension is one of the language skills that needs to be developed at the 8th grade in "Kruger Carrión Loor" middle school, the researchers of this study estimate the role of the English language teacher inside the classroom as imperative since he is a professional and human support for learners. Educators should create a learning environment that promotes students confidence in order to assist learners to develop and strengthen clarity and accuracy comprehension when listening a foreign language.

Pourhossein & Reza (2011) state that listening comprehension is crucial in the learning process. Because of this, effective listening strategies and appropriate and positive learning environment that avoids intervention and distraction. When students work in the mentioned skill, it is necessary to retain learners' attention and to obtain higher rates of answering when the teacher displays questions. Thus, the application of listening strategies allows students to receive meaningful input that facilitates knowledge acquisition and improvement of listening comprehension skills, and the completion of specific listening tasks.

The research in its process is generated in three steps to follow which the analytical method will pleased the 150 students already enrolled in 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th of ESO (Compulsory Secondary Education) and 1° and 2° of Bachelor in the City of Madrid with different institutions in mind as a whole.

A large part of the participants (70%) indicate in a real way that the foreign language does not incur the greatest problem in the classroom. They indicate that the teacher speaks the native language (Castilian) for certain explanatory moments. Twenty-seven percent of those surveyed through the survey tool feel the complex of being able to express themselves in English in a social way compared to 73% that if they can express or maintain the facility to express themselves in the language, not in a fluid way but achieve dialogue in the foreign language by understanding a foreigner in his oral and written expression. 52% of students believe they can understand a native speaker from the United States or the United Kingdom, but 48% say that it is impossible for them to understand or understand a native speaker, in many cases students listen to the teacher's interpretation and compared to what they hear on a CD player and this does not allow them to progress because everything is very complex in their understanding. There is a chance that this problem can be solved, which could be socialized through a social and educational project that exchange students from Englishspeaking countries participate in the teaching-learning process and contribute in their language the enrichment that this students of can generate 36% of these students can watch videos in the original version and understand what the characters express within it, 64% of the participants sometimes focus their attention on watching and listening to the original videos. (Cortez, 2017).

Cortez, Sorto & Velasquez (2015) applied most used listening strategies and concluded that it was possible to show how important the use of listening strategies helps with the development of their listening skill in the English language and how to recognize which are necessary and use them for the benefit of students, (Cortez, 2017)

It was possible to know that mostly pre-listening strategies used by students to increase their listening skills were auditory monitoring and planning. Students knew how to manifest that their development and hearing ability increases using such strategies.

Theoretical Foundation

This process, based on understanding and evaluating the auditory system, is oriented in that development must lead to the order of functions that involve the actual action or fact of the teaching process.

Indicates that the knowledge that professional science education personnel must generate the student or student population should effectively guide the auditory understanding of the process in the classroom. In addition to this the class planning process should guide the acquisition of knowledge. On the basis of reception and productivity in acquired comprehension skills, the first one indicates that the student will be able to verify, recognize and express what he sees and hears but in the foreign language according to applied exercises. The point is once acquired the ability to understand the system of induction of learning to students. This frames the distinction in the spoken exercise. In practice, specific points should be prioritized in forms, games, the use of grammar and spelling to define the understanding of language rules from the beginning to improve the lesson process in the classroom (Pulverness, Spratt and Williams, 2012).

Pulverness, Spratt and Williams (2012) indicate that listening leads to the understanding of skills, adding the following four defined: Speak as a method of information transfer and verbal communication. Exchange of information, where the student can verify and communicate in the English language what he wants to express besides understanding what the other party indicates.

Use of grammar, which can increase the student's vocabulary and gradually increase the pronunciation of words. The social relation, entails the verification of participation between the spoken dialogue the mistakes made and the interaction to solve the problems in the short term. For Thornbury (2012) the ability to speak in the language also entails the skills to understand immediately and relationship in the system spoken according to his phonetics.

Scrivener (2015) indicates that knowing to listen, leads to the acquisition of knowledge in an efficient way and guides the student to be able to speak. This point is reinforced by strategies aimed at making each student able to apply any development, in earlier times this process only aimed at students only acquiring the ability to conjugate verbs and only answer easy questions, that changes over time where the ability guides them to acquire the spoken form, understanding of the heard and form of expression in the continuous dialogue facilitating the teaching process directed by the teacher.

The definition of listening

Harmer (2007) indicates that, as a receptive ability, the learner must acquire an organization and be able to define listening skills, define words in their vocabulary, and convey meanings of pronounced vocabulary and effective learning block. This process is validated by Brinton, et al. (2014) when they include students, listening techniques and maintains the acquisition of variety and strategies for communication skills within the classroom. Crandall and Shin (2014) indicate that "this ability can be overlooked because it seems passive." When people hear, they do not move their lips or take any outside action that they may perceive some kind of long-term danger. However, it is an active process that requires different kinds of skills and strategies." (page 55) Teachers might treat it as

passive as with reading. Nonetheless, it is an interactive skill, as also suggested by Thornbury (2012). Moreover, Crandall & Shin (2014) state that it is an active process. There is interaction between the listener and what is heard. There is a process of interpretion and reasoning the messages. Peterson (as cited in Crandall and Shin, 2014) points out that it is "a multilevel, interactive process of meaning creation."

Listening Comprehension Definition

Listening is considered as the strategy to generate ability to understand different sounds and the statement of sentences that guides the transition to information by speech or continuous dialogue, according to the exercises issued, the phonetics of the student is enabled and expands continuously, establishing strategic parameters where the analysis of the information received means that each student can generate his own dialogue, think and communicate in a correct way, defining stability in the acquisition of student knowledge in the teaching-learning process. Morley (as quoted in Crandall and Shin, 2014) indicates that it should be remembered that classroom facts in English language teaching can generate listening skills and this can support contractual statistics that establish this Process type. Audiobooks are also in the part of improving listening skills. However, they are not that much involved in the classroom in public schools due to their costy prices.

In addition, Wilson (2008) reports that "people listen primarily for information and pleasure." "The BBC was founded in 1922 to broadcast on radio, and its first director general, John Reith, announced that the company should" inform, educate and entertain ". In this same issue, Brown (as quoted in Brinton, et al., 2014) indicates that the meaning of the teaching process in the acquisition of sound abilities means that each student understands at each level the grammatical process and play games that improve phonetics and listening skills.

Listening and the importance in language learning:

People who practice the language, in many cases only know how to express themselves but not to listen, this point generates the participation of the speaker of the foreign language, who acquires the ability of language, reading, listening, speaking and writing as such of which it takes time to achieve absolute mastery, listening or guidance to the achievement of specific objectives. According. Wilson (2008) indicates that the auditory ability encodes the speech, the contractual process in a mental way, establishes the participation of the perception of the main objective that is to speak naturally and acquire the ability of both the native language and the expression and understanding of the foreign language. In the classroom, instructional functions in many cases become boring, to achieve this end, play games and individual participation should be complemented to define student safety in their strategic method of speaking and writing and the end of study listening and understanding what you hear. This process entails checking the development of habits and skills when the teacher and his students generate dialogue in the foreign language.

Teaching listening

The fact that relates the memory to the due process of acquiring skills in the area of listening and being able to express itself, in many cases by boredom recruits the capacity for understanding by hurting the class generated under study techniques by improving the participation of schemes in the classroom of class. Harmer (2007) indicates that listening and understanding can guide the students' cognitive and psychological safety, which can define their strategic guidelines to establish practice parameters and improve oral and written expression and their relationship with listening and understand what you hear.

On the other hand, Brinton, Celce-Murcia and Snow (2014) orient that from the last academics, the process of teaching to listen and to understand what is heard in the English language, generates little polished abilities in the students, for this the teacher must incur to improve the teaching process in the classroom, which only know how to listen is not complementary to define the English language of which in its process.

Pre listening strategies: Pre-listening strategies take aim to deal with all of these issues: to generate interest, build confidence and to facilitate comprehension. In order to achieve this successfully, the following must be taken into consideration as well.

This is perhaps the most important thing to do - when speaking, someone is giving an idea of what the conversation is all about, where and why. In normal life, the idea of the context of something that is being listened to is present. And its **benefits** are self-explanatory by giving students the ability to understand complex audio material in the language, conversation and such.

Generating interest- Motivating students is a key task for teachers to do. If they are to do a listening about sports, looking at some dramatic pictures of sports players or events will raise their interest or remind them of why they (hopefully) like sports. Personalization activities are very important here. A pair-work discussion about the sports they play or watch, and why, will bring them into the topic, and make them more willing to listen.

Activating prior knowledge – "what do you know about...?" is the questions that should address students in order to activate that prior knowledge and vocabulary. The teacher should warm up students with instructions like, 'You are going to listen to an ecological campaigner talk about the destruction of the rainforest'. This sets the context, but if students are put straight in to the listening, the students have had no time to transfer

or activate their knowledge (which may have been learnt in their first language) in the second language. What do they know about rainforests? - Where are they? What are they? What problems do they face? Why are they important? What might an ecological campaigner do? What organizations campaign for ecological issues?

Acquiring knowledge-Students may have limited general knowledge about a topic. Providing knowledge input will build their confidence for dealing with a listening activity. This could be done by giving a related text to read, or, a little more fun, a quiz.

Activating vocabulary / language-Just as activating topic knowledge is important, so is activating the language that may be used in the listening. Knowledge-based activities can serve this purpose, but there are other things that can be done. If students are going to listen to a dialogue between a parent and a teenager who wants to stay overnight at a friend's, why not get students to role play the situation before listening. They can brainstorm language beforehand, and then perform the scene. By having the time to think about the language needs of a situation, they will be excellently prepared to cope with the listening activity.

Predicting content- Once students get to know the context for something, they are able to predict possible content. Giving students a choice of things that they may or may not expect to hear, they need to choose what they think will be mentioned, using their capabilities to put **critical listening** at work for their own behalf.

Pre-learning vocabulary- When students listen in their first language, they can usually concentrate on the overall meaning because they know the meaning of the vocabulary. For students, large numbers of unknown words will often hinder listening, and certainly lower confidence. Vocabulary for students to study before listening, perhaps matching words

to definitions, followed by a simple practice activity such as filling the gaps in sentences should be put into practice first concerning the vocabulary just learn to make it applicable to the task.

Checking / understanding the listening tasks- By giving students plenty of time to understand the main listening comprehension tasks, they would be allowed to get some idea of the content of the listening. They may even try to predict answers before listening, aiding their discriminative listening to the exercise and to their own benefit to be able to differentiate one type of source from another, (Rees, 2011).

Epistemology Foundation

Many son techniques used a journal in the classroom that determine the professional science education that the sea class harnessed to the maximum, as well as specific points that denote the learning process relationship. Thornbury (2012) includes an extensive list of sub-skills that within the practitioner's class can guide their students in constant practice, elevation system by practice and constant monitoring, among the following:

Systematic presentation of listening and their terms

- Systematic presentation of listening and its terms
- Perceive and discriminate individual sounds. At this point you must select the sounds so that the student can orient continuously in the practice of listening, adding the games play to know how to start in the process of sounds.
- Segmentation of the voice stream in recognizable units such as words and phrases. In practice, peer reproduction should be oriented, reading short paragraphs and then extended to lengthy paragraphs and the question of what it means to guide the student in the process of acquiring knowledge.

Systematic presentation of listening and their terms

Use stress and intonation signals to distinguish given information from new information. As Scrivener (2015) suggests, teachers have an effective tool and this should guide oral and written expression to the need to be able to see the purpose of acquiring knowledge.

Attending to discourse markers and using these to predict changes in the direction of the talk. Attend discourse markers and use them to predict changes in the direction of the talk. This process consists of the type of monitoring to see which's is the strategy that is generating the best result before the independent participation of the process of teaching English.

Guessing the meaning of unfamiliar words using context. Nuttall (2015) indicates that the skills to be acquired should be classified as the strategic method to determine who are very advanced and who are really staying in the process of acquiring skills under an effective vocabulary and a vocabulary to be extended and extended by analyzing the process of text to express and understand in their way of hearing what is being defined to the listeners of the classroom.

Use clues in the text (such as vocabulary proficiency) and context clues to predict what is to come. By engaging in the aforementioned, the student, by his own means and initial skills in oral and written expression and begins to define what I have just said indicating that his ability to listen is effective and is giving results today.

Making inferences about what is not said. Really many students find it difficult to engage in targeted tasks, but as time passes through playful games, these students begin to define more technical expression skills by improving listening and understanding skills.

- Integrates the process of the skill by the expression of the information before the visualization by the effect of the recording of his own in the practice.
- The ability to listen, carries through the contractual system in the domain of the teaching process.
- Recognition of what is heard by other speakers without interrupting but knowing that it is going to be expressed continuously.
- To understand under techniques of interest to speak the language.
- Repetition of the other partners and socialization of the implementation of the strategies before the participation of the language and the technicians to improve the listening ability and the understanding of the language.
- Start with song processes, establish a socialization dialogue, can constantly improve the teaching process and participation of all students in what they hear and know what they are saying and then expressed as if it were native language with all participants.
- Singing is a very interesting technique in the participation of the students, the barrier breaks the orients them within the participation in the classroom of the classes on the subject the next level of acquisition of learning.

Scrivener (2015) suggests: "You need to solve your proper particular theory about how the crowd listens so that the orientation tables in the planning that orient the contractual reality of the acquisition process of knowledge, of each student in the foreign language Chomsky cited in Bovitch, Bramwell-Jones, Cullimore, Massas, & Perun, 2011) in the process of observation analysis indicates that the student's curiosity can lead to an evolution in the process of acquisition of knowledge and / can achieve the goal of the student learning the language in the planned time.

Psychological Foundation

In this sense, Metters (2015) has identified three profiles in a learning classroom to train teachers and draw the enormous benefit of their varieties. Motivation to its students, intellect of the juvenile proceeding optimization and strategies for due process in the teaching - learning. The three profiles are:

The naughty.- Being its main factor is to announce the interaction of devils based on playful reflexes to be able to go to define the power of acquisition in the short term.

The know-it-all.- Group of very intelligent students that generate in the short term competition and active participation, of which they are the most calm of classes in which in their organization they raise their hands to speak, since the process of questions that guide responses, make them participatory and competitive on a constant basis.

The zoo. - It entails that the students, establish interactivity and constant participation, from which to verify between murmurs their contractual action in the teaching-learning process considering a type of comfortable relationship according to the drama exposed by all and the socialization they have exposed.

At this point, students in the classroom participate in a normal way, but teachers must be motivated by the practice to be consistent in the process of acquisition of skills in a natural or complex way (Pulverness et al, 2012). In view of the situation expressed, it is possible to overcome fears defined by the students, from which the vocabulary in its extension can guide each student in planning the times for constant practice to define the adjacent points and can have a coordinated time to express their ideas and generate free themes in constant practice.

This two are related not only in the NEW CURRICULAR GUIDELINES that the government of Ecuador emphasizes in the second thread as ORAL COMMUNICATION (LISTENING, SPOKEN PRODUCTION AND SPOKEN INTERACTION) but it is also display in many other concepts that the relationship between listening and speaking is conjugal. Audio CDs are not the only source to improve listening skills. There is the natural relationship between both as when one person speaks, the other person LISTENS.

Buckingham (2015) states that within the capabilities to learn, goals must be set to meet as specific challenges to encourage each student that could enter a system of constant participation in English acquisition throughout the process, which will analyze constant cases of low purchasing power and define the best solutions that maintain or guide successful activities, depending on where to define their interaction.

This teaching process implies that the constant participation of the English language learning system can generate the constant participation of the same. Ward (as quoted in Buckingham, 2015) says that motivation can be compared to justice and less.

This is the consequence when students peak to other students do not have the answer they expected because the listener does not interpret nor understands the speaker or the speech. The productive system to be considered within the process of innovation and updates, which can determine how the process to verify and stabilize the strategic guidelines that favor the process of learning and listening. According to the acquisition of knowledge can be achieved the motivation of the process and increase interest and will.

Pedagogical Foundation

According to Wilson (2008), it entails, according to the designed process, to provide penetration according to the sequential process under efficiency results. This involves the process of providing insights into the sequence of a lesson to achieve effective results. The teaching-learning process consists of detailing the strategic factors in the process of speaking, reading, listening to understand what is being said and writing in the context of skills acquisition. It is considered that the strategic theme that teachers should formulate, will establish schemes of considerable participation in the point of generating ideas and competencies for each student. This situation consists of the preparation and purchasing power of the constant participation of the continuous process of learning in the ability to listen and of the time set to determine the ideas and of the information to be expressed as a method of communication in the English language.

This would possibly generate a type of questioning, based on the raining of questions and exposition of ideas that can originate in the classroom. Based on the above, the teachers' group of school institutions are still planning only time. Students who follow a schedule are used to be used in the process of teaching and acquiring the ability to listen and understand what is heard. The average student usually engages in routine and test activities, which combine the sustainability of the directional process between the top and bottom and vice versa according to each approach. At this point the combination of the play system and the academic process, allow the student to feedback the knowledge and establish the processes to reflect on any type of problem and possibly provide a solution in the short term.

The process of trial activities allow the strategic system of the teaching-learning process, establish or lead to verify the guidelines according to learning experiences listening to the applied reading.

Brinton et al. (2014) indicates in a summarized way that the type of vocabulary should basically guide the type of methodology applied in the acquisition of the language, which according to the approach is considered according to the increase of words and the use of words in an important way and priority.

Grammar-translation approach.- The natural approach generates facilities to facilitate the compatibility of the teaching process, which considers enabling the parameters of understanding important events and not so important in the world, but to achieve this process should motivate the student in a continuous way, without incurring in rewarding students as this would generate shortcomings in the process of acquiring knowledge and listening skills according to the type of lesson issued by the teacher.

The level that has been obtained before the increase of vocabularies in the exposed vocabulary, generates the possible limitation of the student or substantial advance of the same one in the acquisition of the language. The playful material applied, leads to verify that the approach of listening on the part of the student can only be fulfilled when trying to collaborate in groups or facilitate the admission of help for those who least understand the process by the collaboration of those who fully understand everything the process.

The main focus within the learning process is to verify the phonetic strategies being implemented in the oral language and the fluency that is generated when listening to the spoken text. In the British regions. The grammar and words little taken into account do not become important, but how the dialogue has been implemented to the current system of life. The utility of simple texts means that the student can increase his knowledge before listening to the focus on approach in the learning process in the listening and the understanding of the same according to the phonetic training obtained.

Direct method.- The type of text that familiarizes each student serves as usefulness within the synergy in the classroom. The process of drawings, graphics, images and others, are established as the main strategies to successfully achieve teaching. The approach according to the method or technique applied may improve the communication and processing system of information from the native to the foreign language.

Approximation to reading.- The decrease and interest in reading becomes a real problem, the frequent vocabulary when not implementing listening strategies cannot effectively guide students, of which in their usefulness and the frequency level that they is used, leads to an average of 2000 words being used as a minimum factor in the beginning of acquiring knowledge and understanding of reading and text speak, or Michael West (as quoted in Brinton et al, 2014). The process mentioned has not been used in the present times because the idea of stabilizing the conventional system of the constructivist process in the acquisition of the language according to the play materials used becomes confused.

Audiolinguistics.- Used to be able to effectively guide the illustration of grammar and inclusion of the system before the vision of the purchasing process of knowledge that guide the memorization of the vocabulary exposed and the generation of habits that allow regular feedback to students on the skills acquired.

The instruction of the communicative language.- The glossary is defined based on the authenticity of the process, this entails to verify how useful the use of the same, and how can present cognitive strategies that favor the acquisition of knowledge in the classroom.

Nuttall (2015) in his approach to the subject, indicates that the importance of the same is due to practice, for this many students ignore and do not attend the teacher's ease of speech in English language teaching,

being the representation of classes dynamics that generate synergy that will facilitate the process of acquiring the ability to listen actively and receptively. The active part, generates the ability for the student to evolve daily, the second group entails to verify the recognition of the text but not to answer what has been understood, the actor at this point only identifies everything he hears but does not consider that the important part of the language or L1 in the learning of any foreign language. In this situation the differentiation of words focuses on the strategic aspects of communication issued by each student.

Cohen (2014) in his contribution of a teaching technique based on the use of vocabulary. It involves a direct way of entering short textbooks that increase the vocabulary per book dynamic and that fit in a pocket of habitual clothes, generating a habitual system of the language conveyed continuously by the student. This technique is considered low cost and of absolute utility, many students do not take advantage of this resource but most that if it takes advantage of it, determines that a complete book would generate unwind and fatigue but a pocket book is easy to access, it only maintains it essential in the classroom and facilitates the student acquisition process at the time it is generated. The beginning of this technique, should consider the selection of words from the simplest to the most complicated and in a few words the relationship of the same. It is considered as an enabler the system of issuance of pocketbook or play cards according to the type of study to be applied.

It is considered important that the level of guidance that teachers can apply will improve each activity and participation in the acquisition of knowledge in the classroom. Cohen (2014) indicates that if teachers involved more students, they could consider language as the visual and listening system that play cards establish in the teaching process. The participation of the fact, are of the utmost importance since as a company, they may consider that the usefulness of the card can be used from both

sides and establish the approach lost by the student in the teaching-learning process. A template is useful when students can say that the fear of expressing themselves in the English language is improving more and more, the usefulness of the double card, considers that the necessary words are important to implement the growth of vocabulary when learning the foreign language.

Pulverness et al (2012) it indicates that in the constructivist development that through the teaching process emitted by the teacher, this leads to constant practice in continuous control. The use of language, should set the parameters of a positive and non-negative environment as usually happens in today's classrooms. The application of strategies, the type of exercises, tools and playful materials, participation to gradually involve grammar and establishing the orientation to increase vocabulary in a constant way that lead to reading, writing listening and understanding in all aspects that allow an effective pronunciation.

Although the above becomes beneficial, the participation of internal importance is not used by the student and limits it to a context that achieve boredom, but if strategies are used and parameters are established where the incessant participation leads to the generation useful preparation, would not generate problems for any student, but would facilitate the process of learning and listening in the language correctly and effectively.

The constant practice but controlled use, would make the student useful skills and this would incur in reading without getting bored of it and expose their constant participation in the system to improve pronunciation of the language, generate important correctives and establish feedback at the end of practice or lesson in the classroom.

Sociological Foundation

This situation can lead to being intended to belong in the process of socialization, where people and adopts the necessary values to be able to implement improvements where the student can express themselves in the contractual objective or group processes in continuous development. This could be limited to a poor vocabulary, but if the participation of the contractual system in the acquisition of knowledge, the language can be acquired in the short term, under constant practice can be established parameters of continuous benefit and in turn this may detail the orientation to define their participation in society, learning of the multicultural system of the sector, customs, and magnification of the internal process in all important aspects. At this point the teachers, lead to the need to promote strategic norms and practices that improve the teaching-learning process.

The group of students within the classroom must combine the values acquired, the systems of words implemented, the exchange of these words and the constructivist structure in the process of sharing the skills and establish based on quantity the absolute quality in this aspect . The constant participation of the play material and the short and long text will allow the student to speak in the foreign language and listen to the same generating understanding between both processes. Pulverness et al (2012) recommends that group work should be oriented and interactive parameters should be established in the continuous development according to planning and coordination to the curricular mesh that allows the constant practice to benefit the process of acquiring knowledge in the listening of the language.

Scrivener (2005) guides q to analyze the type of situations that are occurring in the classroom, for this the students will be able to analyze the teachers and the teacher to all their students and the use of the technological resource in the constant dialogue. On the other hand, Bilbrough (2007) indicates that the current literature of the foreign language

in the continuous language will be able to remit the feeling emitted by the interlocutors in the interaction of English participation. It also exists to be able to respond to the transfer system based on the information obtained, implemented the ludic strategies and the use of the synergy to the motivation of the same, implementing the expected communication opportunity.

The practice of listening comprehension is a daily task for language learners. It is also the most negative when it comes to examinations in the classroom. The student feel reluctant to such listening task due to the insufficient practice in such skill (Scrivener, 2005)

Legal Foundation

Teachers in the classroom, based on considering or certifying the level of understanding of B2 language that will be eligible and participatory in secondary schools. Higher level teachers should achieve at least C1 level in order to become teachers in a secondary education classroom and B3 for the school system. Although the high school student must reach level B1 and in his university studies level B2, he does not conceive of the constant participation of the conventional system of this whole process.

The language should consider its participation in the natural system of expression without forcing current knowledge and facilitate the level of teaching learning in the interaction of communication based on the information obtained.

The language under strategies proposed in level B2 considers that the student will already be able to speak and think in English and acquire the ability to listen and understand what is heard by opining and defining the language's response in all aspects. Buckingman (2015) states that "allowing students to concede is minuscule what creates the discrepancy between a readiness in which there is teaching that is occurring or in which students are existing under their probability" (page 31)

The structure of the skeleton of language maintains, among its interactivity, participatory communication in the phonetic system of expression of prayer.

The National Plan for Good Citizen Living, generates within its norms, based on the contemporaries that generate facilities of the humanity in the process of which constitutes and builds quality society in the equity of the educational process to the citizenship in general. The Sumak Kawsay leads to verify how it can generate a reinforcement in the social field, from which the community should present the type of value it requires to be able to obtain educational and constructive happiness in every aspect.

In Ecuador, the Government of the Eco. Rafael Correa, generated a lot of investment in education, of which coordination and development planning, leads to the objectives according to the central public policy. This process entails verifying the contractual system that the curricular mesh generates based on the articles that Article 26 of Objective 4 of the LOEI, (Ley Organica de Educacion Intercultural y Reglamento, General Law, Section 26, 2011) and these laws and regulations support the investigation because it is in compliance within the presiding norms and parameters that the constitution establishes in the articles mentioned previously. The standards and fundamental grounds for this project are also to improve and made vigilant within the required time all the recommendations that this project will support.

CHAPTER III

METHODOLOGY, PROCESS, ANALYSIS AND RESULT DISCUSSION

Methodology Design

This project can be stated as of mixed method because the data is focused on quantitative and qualitative research. The aim of this investigation project is to establish that the participation between variables is considered important. Of which the pre-listening strategy can guide the benefit of the acquisition of the English language, where the listening comprehension would deepen the students of the "Kruger Carrión Educational Unit".

The institution based on the strategies to be proposed leads to verify how the current system can establish a precise system of contingents that improve the learning process of the language and its understanding based on the instruments used in the field investigation, the main focus is to generate qualitatively under the system of empirical and theoretical development. It is also of quantitative character because of the percentages and numeric results that the surveys and analysis provide.

Types of Investigation

Applied Investigation

The prior investigation of the study problem considers that constant intervention should be made in the process of improving teaching guidelines in the classroom, which should create the effective method that leads to listening comprehension through the students of the "Kruger Carrión Educational Unit".

Descriptive Investigation

This development under the descriptive methodology considered that the difficulty of acquisition of listening skills, are generated effectively in the eighth grade students of the Kruger Carrion Educational Unit are facing today.

Explicative Investigation

This investigation is explicative because it tries to explain how the lack of listening comprehension that substantially affects the progress of acquisition of listening skills in the students of the "Kruger Carrión Educational Unit". It is caused as important factors of the situation of the anticipated problem:

- Deficiency of didactic resources for develop of listening skill.
- Difficulties to activate previous knowledge for listening skill development.
- Incorrect use of listening strategies by the teacher.

Population and Sample

The chart below details the amount of students of the 8th grade and the staff of the Unidad Educativa Kruger Carrion, District # 8, zone 8, Circuit 06, Province of Guayas, City Guayaquil, Elective period 2016 – 2017 as an important basis of development. At this point, although the study population is less than 100 students, it is not necessary to apply statistical formula since the population is the same used in the educational institution mentioned.

Methods of the Investigation

The specialized methodology used was the following:

Theoretical Methods

Analysis – Synthesis. This method allows the decomposition of the educational movement (teaching-learning about listening, vocabulary and auditory comprehension) and, otherwise, the understanding of the constructivist parts that guides the systematization and organization of play strategies based on achievement of students' ability to listen to the English language.

Deductive The particle process based on the previous inquiry, considers as important the particular cases exposed in the "Educational Unit Kruger Carrión", so that would be incurred in general knowledge. It maintains a synthetic-analytic process, concepts, axioms, statutes or canons, from which personal terminations or solutions are extracted and presented, based on general beliefs.

The methodical technique follows the following steps:

- Attention.
- Insight.
- Manifestation.

Historic-logic. Based on the above, it is possible to incur verification under the historical aspects of the study subject, which seeks to verify the points that deepen the problem, from which a type of care schedule can be defined based on the problems of the history of the institution that originates the feasible solution of the problem.

Systematic-structural-functional As a possible solution, an Activity Manual is generated that generates the ability to listen and establish contractual parameters that allow the constant participation in the column of the teaching-learning process in the description of the analytical process of the system.

Types of Investigation

The previous inquiry, is established in three important points of which were considered as: exploratory, descriptive and explanatory. The first point is generated through the exploratory method, which addresses the process that would stabilize or impair the acquisition of knowledge of students, descriptive research because it describes the system of elements of the teaching process and explanatory because it contributes to the knowledge acquired as a participatory strategy in a scientific way.

Instruments and Techniques

The following parameters were implemented under the tools and techniques:

It was incurred to acquire real information, of which eighth grade students during the use of participatory **surveys** according to questionnaire, which entailed to verify the information obtained and to raise according to their development the contractual level of participatory skills and listening comprehension of the English language, verify the main phonetics to improve the auditory level and the implementation of pre-listening strategies.

The interview was conducted to the 8th grade teacher through a deliberate colloquium with the purpose of obtaining information on the established variables and the possible proposal of the situation.

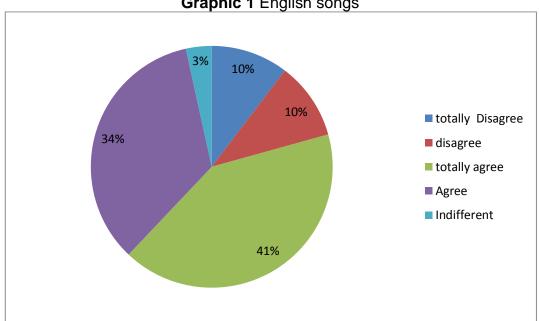

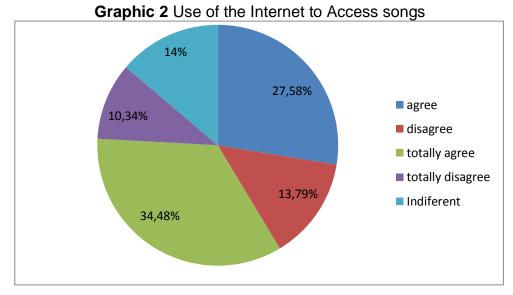

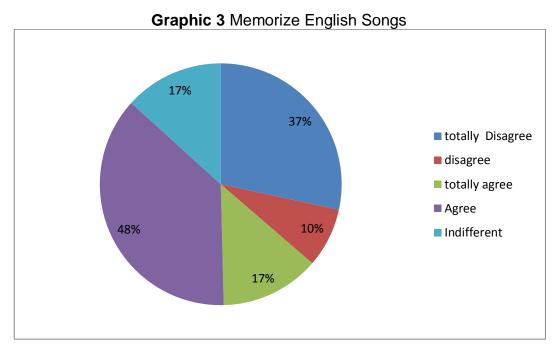

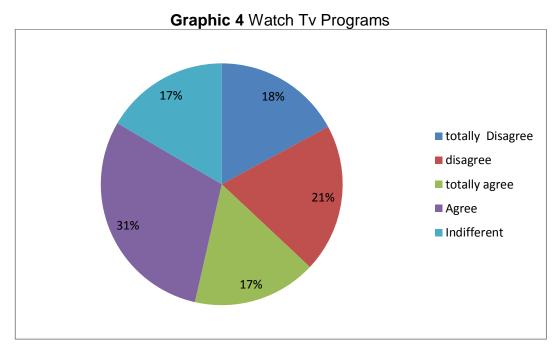

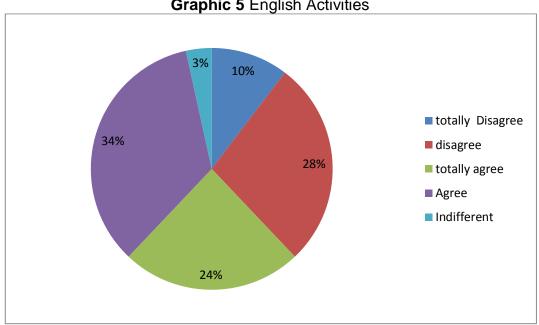

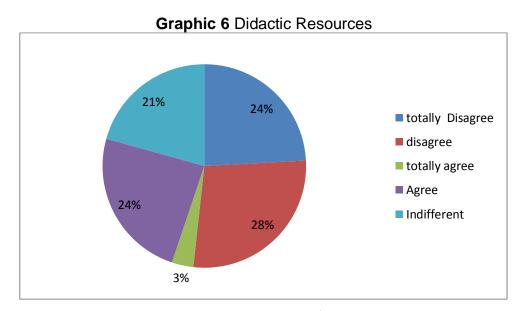

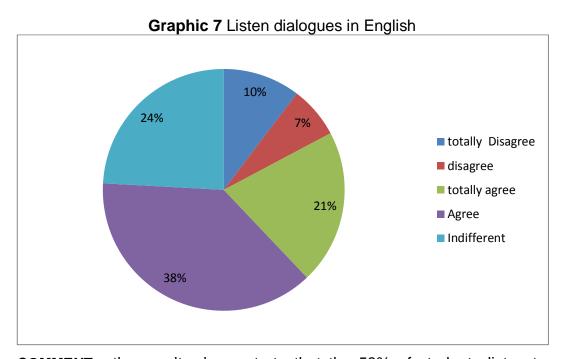

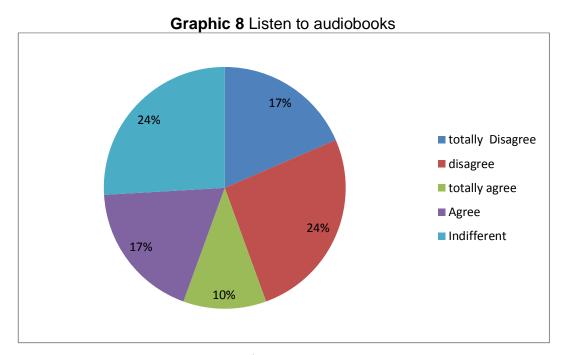

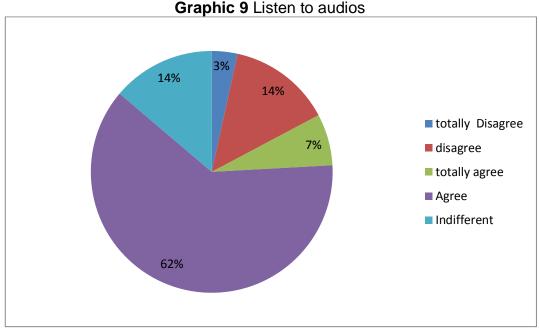

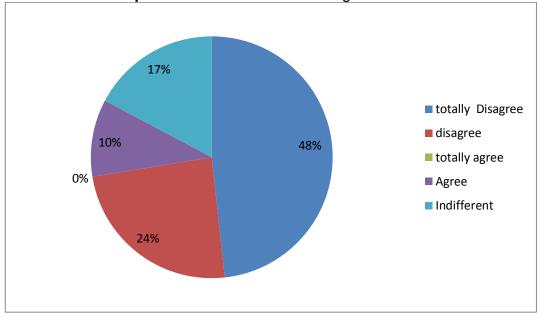

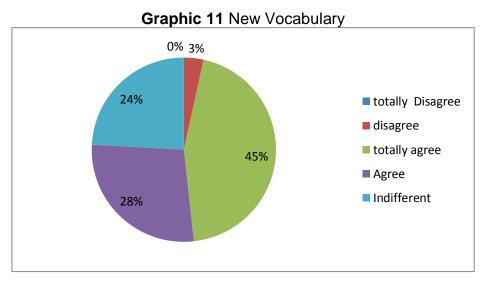

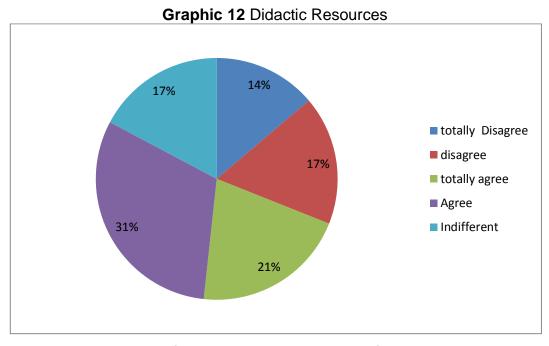

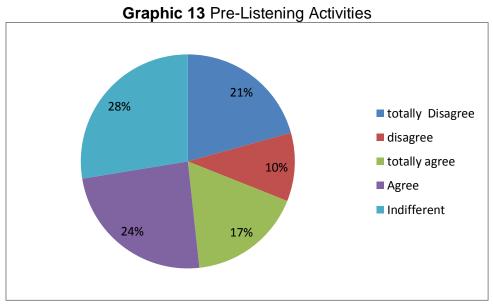

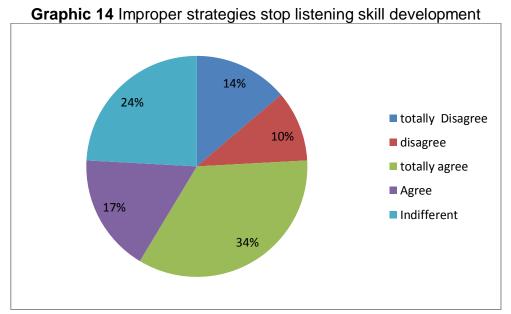

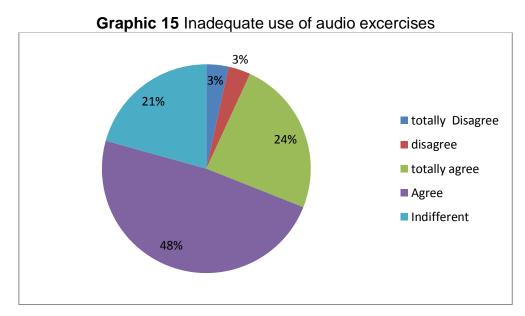

CHAPTER IV

PROPOSAL

Design a manual guide with pre-listening activities.

Justification

According to the results of the survey carried out in students of the 6th basic year at Unidad Educativa Kruger Carrion, there is a deficiency with the development of the main consciousness of which the acquired knowledge, generates a type of vocabulary based on the capacity acquired according to the conventional system and avoiding student stress in the acquisition of knowledge effectively. For this reason, it is very important to develop a useful material to assist teachers to improve their students' listening skills, through a manual with pre-listening activities.

Pre-listening activities are developed before starting a listening activity in order to prepare students for listening. These activities have various purposes, including pre-teaching or activating vocabulary, predicting content, generating interest and checking understanding of task that will improve students' insufficiency in pre-listening tasks and listening activities.

The understanding of listening skill, as important as other skills, is essential for English language TEACHERS through the use of a manual guide with pre-listening activities focused on listening comprehension.

The main idea according to the objective, with the aim of improving the type of oral and written expression and the system of skills that allows to establish the continuous improvement of establishing strategic parameters in the acquisition of the language, from which to establish prelistening activities including activities that are timed in order for the student

to improve by identifying cognates and the other strategies that involve prelistening activities. These well-designed listening activity are broken down into carefully sequenced "phases" that build on each other. The initial prelistening phase should prepare students by helping them activate their background knowledge and clarify their expectations and assumptions about the text. Theoretical Aspects

The design model is generated as a guide to pre-listening activities that focus on the process of listening comprehension considering the following parameters.

Pedagogical

Communication is the process that will allow the student to solve their problems in constant practice in acquiring the language. According to Wilson (2008), it indicates that the process of acquisition of knowledge about the sequential that allows to mention the due process according to the abilities under effective results, generates constant participation of different abilities and the use of books that allow to improve the daily reading to be able to it expressing orally and thus be able to establish the strategic requirements needed by the student so that in the short term the student can express himself in the foreign language and be able to understand what he speaks.

Under these parameters the contractual interest according to the subject of study, allows to consider that the interactivity is participatory and that the students initiate the process of up and down and vice versa. It is proposed as an extracurricular activity manual that helps teachers with listening activities with the **Starship English textbook** which is used in Public Middle and High Schools with 8th grade students. However, this manual can be applied in other kind of texts because diverse activities can be suggested and modified to be applied to other kind of texts with similar topics. - 9. First day of school unit 4 (instructions for the suggested activities are included).
- A- This manual will contain 4 units. Each unit will have its topic and the following specific elements as the general objective to be reached for that unit.
- B- **Pre-listening strategies** will <u>explain the diverse listening strategies</u> and skill proposed for the unit.
- C- **Listening activity** will guide the teacher about <u>the book to be used</u>, <u>page and the audio corresponding to the listening activity in the book</u>.
- D- Suggested Activities- on this chart, the teacher will find five suggested activities where each one of them will include a specific objective and purpose. These activities are planned for the teacher to choose one of them to be applied with the specific exercise in the text. The teacher needs to select the activity related to the class accordingly. Each activity will contain the name of the activity, the time for preparation, the time for completion, materials to be used, group configuration, seating arrangement, related vocabulary skills which are abilities that can be orchestrated as integrated skills to the activity at hand. Skills as listening, speaking, reading, vocabulary and grammar in some cases. The step by step will be provided for the teacher.

The dynamic activities, lead to a style of contractual processes that will allow the locks, of the foreign language learning model, considered important to generate language listening skills and understanding of the language, directly involve and benefit in a suggestive way the students of the 8th grade in the Kruger Carrión Educational Unit will be able to participate in these and multiple achievements to their parents, generating a comprehensive stability in the acquisition of the language, the contribution to the current society and the system considered as strategic to determine the lexicon in a situation where the variation of knowledge can affect the same and destabilize the interest for the appreciation of the English language learning in all aspects, for this the guide or manual of processes is considered as the best strategy. The manual guide of pre-listening activities include:

- Unit 1- Pre-listening vocabulary pronunciation, links of activities that can assist students to differentiate intonation of the new vocabulary words that they are learning.
- Unit 2- Matching activities in which students select the word they hear from an activity worksheets.
- Unit 3- Pre-listening activities to focus are important for the student because they will focus on how the student can relate the meaning, intonation, stress of the key words that are going to be in the listening activities with the help of pictures that are in four different activities for the class.
- Unit 4- filling in the blanks activities to help in the development of listening skills and other didactic activities
- Unit 5- reinforcement related activities will help students to practice more pre-listening activities with related exercises of the other units that have been conducted.

The aforementioned will be able to define the teaching-learning process, establishing strategic parameters where students with acquired

skills will be able to define the system of continuous communication of the language and creation abstract thinking of the same improving increasingly until the language can be acquired effectively without any complication. Cognates and other miscellaneous activities will be used in reinforcement exercises to encourage students to make proper use of pre-listening activities and apply them in listening comprehension.

As previously mentioned, this proposal results will **consist of 5 units** with 5 exercise in where students will be listening to conversations and accidental contexts in which the students will have to recognize the issues in each pre-listening diligence with their own expression or the sentences of the reheating procedures.

These pre-listening activities are important because as previously mentioned students will **match pictures and words** by using images with key words that the teacher believes are necessary for the student to know about them.

Images related to the words and have four different game activities in such task. The teacher will divide the class in four different groups and assigned an activity to each group and involved in games.

Students will have 3 minutes for student to match pictures and words, then students will be asked to pronounce the words, then the CD will be played so students could listen and repeat the words.

Conclusions and Recommendations

Conclusions

- Skills applied on the basis of obtaining the conventional system, generates facility in the continuous development, of the student under the ability to listen, with these parameters could indicate that the strategies generated the expected results.
- Students do not obtain motivation from their teachers which harms the foreign language skills process.
- The level of acquisition of knowledge, considered appropriate, is not producing the desired effect, generating contractual skills that do not allow parameters to be established and general skills to grow.
- There is no motivation about the success of each student based on the use of continuous reading, and the strategic parameters are not generated to induce the student to read continuously.
- Interaction and development of auditory abilities are not considered important, from which a process of updating and continuous training in the use of effective techniques could establish the desired parameters to solve the problem in every aspect.
- It is necessary to reactivate the enthusiasm in the classroom, doing demonstrative exercises, preparing the lesson appropriately so that students feel motivated to learn English.
- Practicing in class pre-listening activities will gradually lower the lack of listening understanding in students.
- Didactic and dynamic classes will set the ambience in a more active tone giving students the proper participation with activities done in the classroom.
- Pair work and group work will allow for the required techniques to be put into practice at a maximum in order for students to acquire pre-listening skills and total listening development.
